Linnea Hall, Director of the Western Foundation of Vertebrate Zoology, will discuss the WFVZ's decade of research on the birds of Ventura County's Santa Clara River. She will highlight monitoring and experiments with Least Bell's Vireos and Yellow-billed Cuckoos. She will discuss the future prospects for these and other bird species using the river. She will also discuss the intensive habitat restoration efforts by agency,

non-profit and university partners in the watershed, with an eye toward how members of the public might get more involved with actions on the river.

Dr Hall has led the WFVZ and its research efforts for the past 17 years, and has been studying birds for 30 years. She grew up in Ventura County and has watched it change a lot over the past 5 decades. She is passionate about sustaining the ecological integrity of the county. She has a B.S. in Biology from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, an M.S. in Wildland Resource Sciences from U.C. Berkeley and a Ph.D. in Wildlife Ecology from University of Arizona at Tucson. Since 1989 Linnea has conducted more than 150 studies of birds in the western US and Guatemala and published on the findings, as well as edited scientific articles and books for many outlets. She has taught professionally at multiple institutions since 1995, including as a faculty member at California State University Sacramento, an adjunct at UC Santa Barbara's Cheadle Center, and the Executive Director of the WFVZ. Her favorite subject areas are avian ecology, identification, and monitoring, and the relevance of the study of natural history to solving modern day environmental dilemmas. Her primary focus is always on connecting people to nature by introducing them to the beauty and importance of the creatures that are all around us

Saturday, February 1, 7:45 am Lake Casitas

Meet at Las Posas Park and Ride at 7:00 am, or outside the entrance to Lake Casitas at 7:45 am., where we will condense into the fewest possible number of vehicles (note: entry fee is \$10, please bring funds to help split the cost) and caravan to various locations. We will look for Heron and Egret rookeries as well as Bald Eagle, Great Horned Owl, Red-Tailed and Red-Shouldered Hawk. Other target species include Red-Breasted Sapsucker, Lark Sparrow, Loggerhead Shrike, White-tailed Kite, grebes and other water and woodland birds. If we're lucky, we might spot a Zone-Tailed Hawk. Directions to Lake Casitas: Take the 101 freeway toward Ventura, turn right on Highway 33, turn left on Highway 150 (Baldwin Rd) and then left on Santa Ana Rd. Entrance to Lake Casitas is within the first 100 yds. on the right. Trip leader: Dave Schaar (626) 710-0740

Sunday, February 9, 8:30 a.m. Ventura Settling Ponds

Join trip leaders Dana Duncan and Cody Swanson as they lead us around the settling ponds in Ventura to scour for ducks, herons, grebes, raptors and sparrows. Recently, they have spotted Black-and-white Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, Yellow-crowned Night Heron and Red-throated Loon here. This is an easy walk. Directions: Meet at the Las Posas Park and Ride to carpool at 8:00 am. Alternatively, meet at Angler Court near the intersection with Spinnaker Drive at 8:30. Wednesday, February 12, 8:00 a.m. Rancho Sierra Vista/Satwiwa

Conejo Valley Audubon invites birders of all experience levels to attend our monthly Beginner Bird Walks at Rancho Sierra Vista/Satwiwa. These walks are held on the second Wednesday of each month. As usual, we will meet at 8:00 am at the main parking lot, which is accessible off Lynn Road at Via Goleta in Newbury Park. Rancho Sierra Vista is an excellent place to see many of the oak woodland birds that are common in the Conejo Valley area. We will take time to introduce beginning birders to these species and will teach the best techniques for locating and identifying them. If you have binoculars please bring them. A few pairs of loaner binoculars will be available. Wear comfortable walking shoes. No signup is needed; just show up. In the event of heavy rain, we will cancel the walk. Sunday, February 16, 8:00 am Malibu Lagoon

Restoration of the previously impaired Malibu Lagoon was completed on March 31, 2013. Come see how this coastal estuary, featuring channels, open river and coastline has recovered nearly seven years later. The 2019 annual monitoring report noted that "post-restoration numbers of birds, species richness, and diversity...remain higher on average for the restored western channels as compared to pre-restoration data." We can expect to see waterfowl, grebes, loons, gulls, terns and shorebirds.

We will also see raptors, sparrows, wrens, warblers, gnatcatchers and flycatchers. Expect as many as 60-70 species, with good weather and good luck. Carpool from Las Posas Park-and-Ride in Camarillo at 7:15 am or meet at the lagoon at 8 am. You can try to find parking on Pacific Coast Highway or park in the State Beach parking lot at the southeast corner of Cross Creek Rd. and PCH (\$12). Trip leader: Bruce Henderson (805) 312-2650

Friday, February 21, 7:45 a.m. Lake Bard (Restricted Access Pre-Registration Required)

Lake Bard is a 10,000-acre-foot open reservoir owned and operated by the Calleguas Municipal Water District and supplied with treated water from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California. The lake supplies water to about three quarters of Ventura County's residents. To preserve water quality, Lake Bard's watershed is completely fenced off to restrict human contact. Jennifer Lancaster of CMWD will escort our group on a moderate three-mile walk. Birds we may encounter include five species of grebes, Ruddy Ducks, Buffleheads, American Wigeons, Gadwalls, Ringnecked Ducks, Northern Shovelers, Canada Geese, Mallards and possibly Canvasbacks. The coastal sage scrub habitat around the lake's perimeter might provide glimpses of Bewick's Wren, California Thrasher, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher and Golden- and Rufous-crowned Sparrows. All participants must sign a waiver and show their driver's license or other government-issued photo i.d. when we meet in the Boardroom at the CMWD office, 2100 Olsen Road. Thousand Oaks, at 7:45. For those with limited mobility, CMWD will graciously provide one or two golf carts (up to 3 passengers each) for movement around the reservoir. Saturday, February 29, 3:00 p.m. - Sunset Birds and a Beer Wildwood/Briar Bluffs/CLU + Draughts

Sleep in and bird on the same day! Join us for late afternoon birding in the hills of northwestern Thousand Oaks, much of which has been preserved as open space. Expected species include California Quail, Mourning Dove, Greater Roadrunner,

California Thrasher, Cactus Wren and a variety of sparrows and finches. Perhaps we'll hear an owl as sunset approaches. If you're hungry and/or thirsty afterward, join us at 6:15 p.m. at Draughts Restaurant and Bar, 398 N Moorpark Rd, Thousand Oaks, 805-777-7883.
