Sunday, September 8, 8:00-10:00 am Santa Clara River (The Nature Conservancy Hanson Property)

The Nature Conservancy has been restoring its 1,000-acre Hanson Property along the Santa Clara River since 2015. Formerly mined for sand and gravel, this private reserve near Santa Paula now boasts lush riparian habitat with coastal sage scrub and chaparral uplands. The site supports a diversity of birds, including various species of herons, egrets, ducks, sandpipers, woodpeckers, raptors, vireos, flycatchers and swallows. We may even spot a Yellow-breasted Chat, Loggerhead Shrike or Lawrence's Goldfinch. While predominantly flat, the terrain is uneven – please wear sturdy footgear. There are no water or restroom facilities. If you wish to carpool, meet at the Las Posas Park and Ride – we will leave promptly at 7:30 a.m. Otherwise, meet in front of the gate at 8:00 am at 1368 Mission Rock Road (yellow farm gate at the end of the road). Space is limited to fifteen. Please RSVP to fieldtrips@ConejoValleyAudubon.org, and you will be provided a link to complete the online waiver in advance. #### Beginning Bird Walk Rancho Sierra Vista/ Satwiwa Wednesday September 11, 8:00 am

Conejo Valley Audubon invites birders of all experience levels to attend our monthly Beginner Bird Walks at Rancho Sierra Vista/Satwiwa. These bird walks are held on the second Wednesday of the month. As usual, we will meet at 8:00 am at the main parking lot,

which is accessible off Lynn Road at Via Goleta in Newbury Park. Rancho Sierra Vista is an excellent place to see many of the oak woodlands birds that are common in the Conejo Valley area. We will take time to introduce beginning birders to these species and will teach the best techniques for identifying them. If you have binoculars please bring them. A few pairs of loaner binoculars will be available. Wear comfortable walking shoes. No sign-up is needed. Just show up. In the event of heavy rain we will cancel the walk. The walk leader will be Richard Armerding (310) 701-3878

#### Sunday, September 15, 8:00 am Arnold Road/ Ormond Beach

We will look for a variety of shorebirds at this excellent coastal location. There is a good chance of encountering Willets, Whimbrels, Black-necked Stilts, Black-bellied Plovers and other interesting If we're lucky, we may spy endangered birds. Western Snowy Plovers on the beach and Red-necked Phalaropes migrating through. We will also look for Peregrine Falcons, Ospreys, Loggerhead Shrikes, Savannah Sparrows and Blue-gray Gnatcatchers. Dress in layers as the morning may be chilly. Please bring a scope if you have one. This is an easy walk, though it may include traversing the beach. Directions: Exit Hwy 101 at Rice Avenue and go south. Continue to Hueneme Rd. and turn right. Take a left on Arnold Rd. and continue to the end of the road. Please note: Avoid leaving valuables in your car. There are portable restrooms at the beach entrance. To carpool meet at the Las Posas Road Park and Ride lot at 7:30 am. #### Sunday, September 22, 9:00 am Ventura Settling Ponds

Join trip leader Frank DeMartino as he leads us around the settling ponds in Ventura to scour for ducks, herons, grebes, raptors and sparrows. Frank enjoys birding the ponds and has much local knowledge of the species we can expect. This is an easy walk. Directions: Meet at the Las Posas Park and Ride to carpool at 8:30 am. Alternatively, meet at the harbor at 9 am, in the parking lot across the street from the ponds, where Spinnaker meets Angler Court. For more information, call Frank DeMartino (856) 906-8733.

#### Sunday, September 29, 8:30 am Pine Mountain

The mountains are calling, so let's journey to Pine Mountain Ridge (over 7,000 ft elevation) in Ventura County. Target species include Brewer's, Black-chinned and Bell's Sparrows, Green-tailed Towhee, White-headed Woodpecker, Pacific-slope and Olive-sided Flycatcher, Western Wood-pewee, Red-breasted and Pygmy Nuthatch, Mountain Quail, Mountain Bluebird, Steller's Jay and Mountain Chickadee. There are limited facilities (vault toilets available at the campground) and no water on this trip. Please plan accordingly. Also, we may experience a wide range of temperatures on our approximately 2 mile hike, so be ready for both warm and crisp weather and rough terrain. Given the distance, we will be gone into the afternoon, so please also bring lunch/snacks. To carpool from Conejo Valley (carpooling suggested due to narrow, winding and occasionally rough roads): Meet at 7:00 a.m. at the Thousand Oaks Transit Center (aka Rancho Park and Ride), 265 South Rancho Road, Thousand Oaks. If you wish, you may meet the group at Pine Mountain Inn at 8:30 a.m. (just past Upper Hartman Ranch Road), located on the right side of the Hwy 33 (it is an abandoned inn/restaurant with a fence around it, but a great stop for sparrows, finches and perhaps Red-breasted Sapsucker). Trip leader is Dee Lyon (805) 427-0987.
