Share The Journey by Carol Langford

What a privilege it is to watch the same birds year after year. "Common Birds in Decline" is the name of an Audubon publication emphasizing the "precipitous population declines" of the birds we used to see all the time. In California, the population of Northern Pintails has declined 96% since 1967! In the same time period the Loggerhead Shrike population has declined 76%. During the early 90s when I first participated in Christmas Bird Count at Hill Canyon with Bill and Jean Hulberg, we always counted Loggerhead Shrikes. Now, we are thrilled to find them.

What can you do to reverse these population declines? Educate yourself. More information about the Common Birds in Decline analysis is available at www.audubon.org.

Take action and encourage others to take action. There are so many things to do. Here are just a couple. With California having lost more than 91% of it's wetlands between the 1780s and the mid-1980s, protecting wetlands and associated uplands is key for shorebirds. You can learn more about supporting state and federal conservation programs at http://www.audubon.org/campaign/cleanWater2.html. Locally, Ormond Beach and the surrounding uplands area are threatened once again by the pressure of housing and commercial development. While the period for public comment on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement has closed there will be opportunities to voice your opinion on the importance of this area to a healthy bird population.

Saturday, September 1 Santa Clara River Mouth

Leave Las Posas Park & Ride at 8:00 a.m. Look for ducks, herons, sandpipers, terns, plovers, phalaropes, turnstones, moorhens, pipits, ospreys, etc. A spotting scope is very helpful. The leader is Oscar Johnson call **Dee at (805) 499-2165**.

Sunday, September 9 Tamarisk Trees & Sod Farms

Leave Las Posas Park & Ride at 7:45 a.m. The Hueneme and Laguna "tams" are some of the best local places to see **migrating warblers**. Past Septembers have yielded Yellow, Townsend's, Black-throated Gray, MacGillivray's, and Wilson's warblers, and even rarities like Prairie Warblers and redstarts, as well as many Warbling Vireos. At the nearby sod farms we will look for various plovers, pipits, and possibly Horned Larks. The leader is **Bets Buchanan (805) 482-0063**.

Thursday, September 13 Beginners Bird Walk

Saturday, September 15 Malibu Lagoon

Leave Rancho Park & Ride at 8 am Look for returning ducks, shorebirds, rails and wrens.

Saturday, September 22 Private Property

This trip will be limited to 25 people. Leave Las Posas Park & Ride at 7:30 a.m., or meet at the end of Casper Road at 8:00. This is usually one of our most productive locations. Expect numerous waterfowl, shorebirds, raptors, and also passerines. We hope-to-see-Baird's Sandpi-

per, Pectoral Sandpiper, and maybe even a Ruff. The leader is **Tom Halpin (805) 746-4598.**

Saturday, September 29 Santa Cruz Island

The Island Jay will take us to Prisoner's Cove on Santa Cruz Island. Boat leaves Ventura Harbor (1/4 mile south of the Channel Islands National Park Headquarters) at 9 am and will return at 5, so bring water, lunch, snacks, Jacket (sea sickness patch if needed, but should be calmest time of year) We will look for other species that may attain full species recognition in the future.

Call ISLAND PACKERS at (805) 642-1393 to reserve your spot! Cost is \$46. per person, \$42 for seniors. If we have 20 we will all get the \$42 rate. We will look for pelagic species to and from the island; shearwaters, alcids, jaegers, Arctic Terns, as well as whales and dolphins. Leader will hopefully be David Pereksta or Oscar Johnson. Continue to participate in citizen science initiatives. Data from the Christmas Bird Counts was used in the analysis of bird populations. California Audubon stresses "participating in the Christmas Bird Count, the Great Backyard Bird Count and entering bird observations into California eBird are all important ways to help ornithologists track bird populations."

Audubon chapters in California hold over 1000 field trips per year. I know you will join us again this year as we scout for those "same old birds." Invite a friend or neighbor to join you. By increasing the number of people who appreciate the birds and habitats around us, we increase the number of voices willing to speak out in favor of conserving both the habitats and the birds. 7 intrepid birders rose above our 6 hour trip to Big Bear on Fri, June 22 (car breakdown with rental van replacement!) to find near 70 species in lovely weather.

The Williamsons were unable to make the trip due to illness and I'm hesitant to report that our best bird was, yes, Williamson Sapsuckers, probably 2 pairs plus juvenile, just west of Bluff Lake. Tom Halpin found an adult male on the ground showing brilliant yellow and red; quite a gorgeous bird. We saw Common Loons on the lake, plus a rare treat, a Peregrine Falcon making half a dozen passes at bats at dusk just over the lake. Quite a sight; don't know whether or not he caught any.

We had lessons in identifying Dusky Flycatchers from Summer Wilson and saw baby Wood Ducks floating by. We think we know the Green-tailed Towhee's song thanks to Kevin Pickard. Fortunately our usual bird feeder stop found a big male Mountain Quail that we had great looks at through the scopes. At our own feeder, we had a Rufous Hummingbird on its way back south already; the Wood Ducks were in eclipse but the ducklings were cute. Unfortunately, I don't have access to the internet up there, so we missed the two reports of Red-faced Warbler at Green Canyon! Oh well. Great looks at Townsend's Solitaire and we learned the Fox Sparrow and Green-tailed Towhee songs. Lots of fun but not home till mid-day Monday.
