



#### **Ventura County Science Fair**

Conejo Valley Audubon Society was pleased to give two awards on April 24 at the annual Ventura County Science Fair. They were



given in the name of Dr. Elliot McClure, who was an active birder, teacher, and researcher in the field of ornithology. Both awards this year were in the area of Environmental Science. Judging was done by Linda Reynolds and Chrystal Klabunde.

The first award was given to Kristin Lopez, Sacred Heart Elementary School.

Her project was entitled "Garbage Blues". Kristin buried eleven different objects in soil, dug them up at regular intervals, and checked their rate of decomposition. Her samples were on display.

The second award went to Amy Schwartz of Medea Creek Middle School. Her project was about hydro pollution, entitled "How pHresh is your water"? Amy sampled water at least six locations along Medea Creek, measuring amounts of pH, ammonia, salinity, nitrates and nitrites. Bottles of water from each location were on display.

Both girls used proper scientific testing procedure, did their own work, had attractive displays and well written reports. They each received an award certificate from Conejo Valley Audubon Society accompanied by a check for \$100.00.

#### **Ecological Field Study Program**

The Conejo Valley Audubon has been privileged to participate in an ecological field study program at Sequoia Middle School, Newbury Park, starting in February of this school year. The environmentally aware, enthusiastic, fantastic teacher is Allen Saute--teacher of the month this year for the Conejo Valley School District.

Each week or 2 week visit, with the help of at least 2 volunteers from our group, the class has observed and looked for birds on the campus. They have sixteen new 10x42 Bushnell Explorer binoculars, obtained through DonorsChoose.org (they hope to obtain 24 more through DonorsChoose.org funding), and field guides and have learned to use them. They record data in their log books, helping them to identify species and behavior and what it means. They were able to follow the development of a hummingbird nest until the babies had fledged. They also are studying mammals and plants on the campus. The native garden of over 300 plants, created last fall, is doing well. The bird list for campus sightings is now at 43.

The project is proposed for many years, and next year, plans are to continue at Rancho Sierra Vista in a joint National Park Service Project called TREE (Teens Restoring Endangered Ecosystems). The 100 students will go for all-day field trips every 2 weeks, rotating every hour. We are to be responsible for one of the sessions, discussing birds and related topics. This is an exciting program, and we are delighted to be involved in exposing young people to the environment and to birding.

It will also be a commitment, as it has been this year. I would like to express my appreciation to all who have helped this year, we have had 14 members of our group visiting the class--Laurie Van Stee, Dee Lyon, Linda Easter, MaryAnn Campbell, Chris Bumbar, Tom Halpin, Bill and Jean Hulberg, Bets Buchanan, Summer Wilson, Babette Lawall, Carol and Bill Langford, and Linda Reynolds.
