Saturday, October 4 Malibu Lagoon

Meet at 8:00 am at Rancho Road Park & Ride or at 8:30 in the Malibu Lagoon parking lot (ocean side of Hwy 1). Shorebirds, herons, gulls, ducks, and marsh birds make this oasis a great spot. Rarities are often seen! **Thelma Williams** is the leader, (805) 492-2796.

Thursday, October 9 Beginner's Bird Walk

Sunday, October 12 Cañada Larga Road

Meet at the start of the road after the exit from Hwy 33 at 8:00 am. Bring water and lunch. Birds we will look for include: black-headed and blue grosbeaks, warblers, orioles, Costa's hummingbird, Lewis woodpeckers, lazuli buntings, western bluebirds, and barn owls. **Tom Halpin** leads, (805) 746-4598.

Saturday, October 18 Ormond Beach



TREE Project by Thelma Williams

Once again this school year we are privileged to participate in the TREE (Teens Restoring Endangered Ecosystems) program with Sequoia Middle School dedicated teacher Alan Saute and his students. We will also be working with staff of the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. We will be birding with small student groups every other Thursday from September 2008 to June 2009 at Rancho Sierra Vista-Satwiwa. Our emphasis will be on plantbird association, wildlife interaction with plants and the use of habitat. The commitment will be from 9am-1pm each time. Every student has binoculars and guide books and has been introduced to the area. They will also be doing restoration work, weeding, and planting the plants they have grown in the school nursery.

The section of the park they will be working in, coastal sage scrub and riparian habitats, is the home of the scarce grasshopper sparrow, as well as many other bird species. We know and love this birding environment.

This is a wonderful, exciting opportunity for our Audubon group to interact with the community, the youngsters, and the environment. Those who participated last year, birding at the school only, enjoyed it thoroughly. For our recent anniversary, my husband surprised me with a copy of *Peterson Field Guide to Birds of North America*. This book was published to celebrate the centennial of his birth - August 28, 1908. It combines Peterson's guide to Eastern and Western birds in one volume. It has been completely updated; there are all new range maps; text has been rewritten; and there are digital enhancements to some of his original drawings. Kimball Garrett reviewed and revised some of the voice descriptions.

An added feature is that you get access to a web site with podcasts about the book and the birds. I was able to access the web site and navigate through it easily and I am a novice computer user.

The book is just beautiful. It is a 6" by 9" soft back book. The cover (see the cover image above) is Peterson's exceptional painting of a pair of Northern Flickers. The range maps are bigger, it is in the new taxonomy order, and the pictures are bigger. It is a must have for your bird library.
