General Meeting January 4 7:30 pm Western Foundation

Blake Massey Will Discuss California Condor Recovery Program

Blake Massey, a US Fish and Wildlife Service biologist, will discuss the current status, management, and research efforts of the California Condor Recovery Program. (See photo right.) Blake will compare the historic and current range, population size, and demographics of the species. He will explain the recent successes of the nest-guarding program in southern California and share video footage and first-hand accounts of nest entries. He will present maps with the latest GPS transmitter data and explain how this information provides key insights into seasonal foraging patterns, reproductive efforts, and ongoing range expansions.

Lastly, he will describe the Program's research into potential future habitat needs for condors and predicted changes in their landscape. Blake earned a B.A. in Biology from Vanderbilt University and a M.S. in Wildlife Conservation from the University of Massachusetts - Amherst. He has worked on wildlife research projects on a variety of species including Black Bear, Northern Harrier, Gyrfalcon, Island Fox, Golden Eagle, and Mariana Crow. He has worked with California Condors in both northern Arizona and southern California, and he is currently a field crew leader on the Condor project at Hopper Mountain National Wildlife Refuge Complex.

WALK THE WALK! Ten things you can do to help the environment:

1. Plant a tree. Just to offset your breathing, it takes seven trees to take in your CO2. Please plant a native tree, such as a Black Walnut, a Redbud, one of the native oak trees (used by more birds than any other plant.), a Madrone, a Pinon Pine, a Bigleaf Maple, a Sycamore or check Laspilitas.com for more trees. You can also send a check to Treepeople or the National Forest Foundation and have them plant a tree.

- 2. Conserve water. Most of us are now running the washer and dishwasher with full loads, and many of us are planting yards that use little or no additional water, but there are other things to consider, like trying not to rinse the dishes before putting them into the dishwasher and letting them air dry.
- **3.** Use cloth bags to bring home the groceries from the store. If you forgot to bring it in, make yourself go back out to the car. Buy locally grown produce; go veggie at least one day a week.
- **4.** No more paper Kleenex; use handkerchiefs; no more paper towels; it costs little to toss the cloth towel into the laundry and buy a dozen dishcloths at the 99 cent store and dump those sponges.
- **5.** Don't throw your magazines and newspapers away pass them on to a friend. Get your name off of lists by contacting Direct Marketing Association Mail Preference Service, 11 W 42nd St, P.O. Box 3861, N.Y., N.Y. 10163-3861 **6.** Buy things that will last; keep your car 10
- **6.** Buy things that will last; keep your car 10 years.
- 7. Change your light bulbs to CFLs (compact fluorescent light). If every U.S. family replaced just one hot incandescent bulb with a CFL, it would eliminate 90 billion pounds of greenhouse gases, which is the same as taking 7.5 million cars off the road.
- **8.** Stand up for NATURE; stay informed: write to our leaders and support candidates who want to take care of our world.
- **9.** Think before you drive; every gallon of gas you save helps your budget and it keeps 20 pounds of carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere.
- **10**. Raise the thermostat in summer and use a ceiling fan; lower the thermostat in winter.
