Field Trip Reports

Saturday, May 21st Sisar Canyon by Dee Lyon

We should have been here two weeks earlier; most of the birds seem to be nesting. Two Anna's Hummingbird nests and two House wren nests; lots of Warbling Vireos and Yellow Warblers; Pacific Slope Flycatchers, Ash-throated Flycatchers, Quail, Canyon Wren, Western Wood Peewee, CA and Spotted Towhees, large numbers of Lesser Goldfinch, Nuttal's and Acorn Woodpeckers. Flickers, Red-tails, TV's, Phainopepla, Western and female Summer Tanager, CA Thrasher, Oak Titmouse, Bushtits, Wrentits, Scrub Jays, House Finch, Black-headed Grosbeak, Wilson's and Orange-crowned Warblers, and a Junco. Beautiful day with five of us enjoying the lush scenery and flowers; then on to Bocalli's for strawberry shortcake and a Hooded Oriole.
