Field Trip Reports

Santa Clara River Estuary by Dee Lyon Saturday, September 3rd

About 14 of us hiked in from Surfer's Knoll Saturday morning September 3rd in light fog and pretty cold air. We found ourselves among 70 Snowy Plovers with a cooperative Sanderling among them, then managed to see Long-billed Curlew, Whimbrel, Greater Yellowlegs, Western Sandpipers, Willet, DC Cormorants, Brown Pelicans, huge rafts of Western Grebes, Pied-billed Grebes, Eared Grebes, Rednecked Phalaropes, lots of Western Gulls, California, Ring-billed and Heerman's Gulls, Peregrine Falcon, Northern Rough-winged, Cliff, Barn and Tree Swallows, Mallards, Ruddy Ducks, Gadwalls, Blackcrowned Night Herons, House Finches and Savannah Sparrows. Some folks went on to the Ventura Harbor for the Black and American Oystercatchers, Black Turnstones, Surfbirds, while some of us charged off to Canada Larga, where Kay Regester and Mary Hanson had staked out the Scissor-tail Flycatcher. Nearby were several Mockingbirds and three Loggerhead Shrikes, Kestrels, Western Bluebirds, Black Phoebe, Turkey Vultures, Red-tailed Hawks, Cassin's Kingbird, Mourning and Eurasian Collared Doves, Scrub Jays, Acorn and Nuttall's Woodpeckers.

Donating your hair could help clean up future oil spills. San Francisco nonprofit Matter of Trust collects human and pet hair to create booms that soak up oil. Currently, warehouses are full, but you can be placed on the email alert list when the need arrives again.

- 2. Donating jeans to Goodwill is always a great option. But if they're too raggedy, they can be recycled into cool products. Companies like Green Jeans Insulation and Bonded Logic manufacture insulation products from recycled denim and cotton fibers. Green Jeans Insulation recycles jeans into natural fiber insulation used for interior and exterior walls and ceiling applications.
- 3. Wine really is a zero-waste beverage. Its bottle can by recycled in a glass program, and ReCORK America has drop-off locations for corks at local Whole Foods stores. The best part is that wine itself can encourage the composting process. So, if you have any left over, toss it in the bin!
- 4. Cotton is also fodder for the compost bin. Cotton balls, cotton swabs (as long as the handle is made of cardboard), lint from the dryer and even old shredded cotton and wool clothing can all go in your compost bin
- 5. National Crayon Recycle Program has diverted more than 47,000 pounds of crayons from landfills. The company has drop-off bins nationwide and a mail-back option. The program accepts unwanted and broken crayons for recycling into new crayons.

 6. ReSurf Recycling recycles all surfboards and surfboard manufacturing waste materials into numerous products including asphalt and concrete for paving city roads.
