Papua New Guinea: Birds and People, with Chuck & Lillian Almdale

Papua New Guinea is a land of huge diversity, in terrain, birds and people. Almost half of its 750 avian species are endemic. Of its 830 indigenous languages, half have fewer than 1,000 speakers. In 2008, the Almdales visited six locales in three weeks. Their multi-media presentation features many endemic birds especially the birds-of-paradise as well as the fascinating people of New Guinea, including the Huli Wigmen of the central highlands and the Yukoim cannibal-headhunters of Konmei Village on the Karawiri River in the east Sepik lowlands. Come and remind yourself why you really want to go there.

Chuck & Lillian Almdale have been active in the Audubon Society for over 25 years. When not birding internationally, they lead local field trips, maintain records of Malibu Lagoon birds, census Snowy Plovers, comment on local and national bird blogs and chatlines, and have been on the board of Santa Monica Bay Audubon Society for over 20 years. THE WATER CRISIS.

Half of the pure drinking water that comes to our houses, we throw out on the ground!

We do this while almost one billion people worldwide live without access to clean, safe drinking water.

Among many factors, pollution from industrial and household contaminants as well as changing weather patterns threaten water supplies globally, while shortages in parts of the U.S. are leading to enforced rationing in many heavily populated areas, such as Los Angeles.

IN THE NEWS:

Researchers from Columbia University found that the Southeast U.S. drought that lasted from 2005 to 2007 was due to severe water shortages as a result of population growth, rather than rainfall patterns. Figures show that in Georgia alone, the population rose to 9.54 million in 2007 from 6.48 million in 1990.

A major drought in East Africa has been a major generator of conflict as climate refugees begin to migrate and crowd larger areas. Organizations such as Oxfam and Cafod have launched emergency appeals.

After a three-year drought in California that has resulted in forest fires and extreme water shortages, officials are now tossing around the idea of restoring the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta, a collection of (Continued on Page 2)

Tom Halpin October, 1946 – November, 2011

It was with great sadness that we learned of the passing of
Tom Halpin. Tom was an active member of Conejo Valley
Audubon since the early 1990's and had made many good
friends during his extensive volunteer activities with
Audubon and other community groups.

Tom loved to share his enthusiasm for bird watching with others. He met Elliott McClure, PhD through a Ventura Community College adult education class called Birds of Lowland Ventura County. Eventually Tom began helping with the class, and later taught the it. Tom also taught a bird identification class through Rancho Simi Parks and Recreation. Tom volunteered teaching bird identification and art in public school classrooms and with home-schooled students. He also volunteered at science camp with public school classes. The students and teachers alike loved working with Tom due to his gentle nature, intelligence, sensitivity, and wry sense of humor.

Tom participated nearly every year in the Birdathon fundraiser and Christmas Bird Count. He was CVAS hike and conservation committee chairman for several years. Tom led many bird walks each year. He looked forward to talking with visitors to the Audubon booth at the Ventura County Fair, and often prepared exhibits and illustrations for it. Tom regularly supported Nature Day and other awareness activities. He was a volunteer naturalist for Conejo Recreation and Parks District's Sycamore to the Sea hike. He also was a SOAR activist.

Tom was very popular on field trips for his uncanny bird spotting ability. That talent helped raise funds for CVAS

when he was auctioned at the annual dinner as a bird walk guide.

Tom's love of nature and passion for bird watching was revealed in his artwork and photography. He frequently entered photos, drawings and paintings in competitions at the Ventura County Fair, and often earned ribbons for his pieces. His paintings and photographs are familiar to club members from publication in the CVAS newsletters and on the club website. His drawing of a Red-tailed Hawk is on the cover of the Naturalist Handbook of Plants and Animals of the Santa Monica Mountains and Surrounding Areas written by Sharon Hardee, and his portrait of a Killdeer is inside of the book.

Tom seemed to love anything in the sky. He had an avid interest in airplanes and volunteered at the Santa Paula Airport Museum. Tom could identify nearly any plane flying overhead. He loved attending local air shows and the Santa Paula Citrus Classic Balloon Festival. He also enjoyed the bi-annual summer astronomy talks at Lake Casitas.

In tribute to the invaluable contributions that Tom made to Conejo Valley Audubon, an annual bird walk will be named in his honor.
