### Mary Freeman presents: The Northern Sawwhet Owls of the Angeles Crest

During the five years of the Los Angeles County Breeding Bird Atlas survey, data on this owl species were sorely lacking. In response, Mary set out over the past 12 years to study the status and distribution of this little-understood owl in the changing San Gabriel mountains. Come and listen as Mary gives an overview of her findings relating to Saw-whets, other owls and wildlife encountered during the project.

Mary is a native of Los Angeles, and has led birding trips since the late 70s. She likes to bird by ear, has a BA in art design, illustrates birds, designs jewelry, and has searched out owls throughout the Americas. But her greatest passion is surveying Saw-whets in our local mountains.

## Conservation Column By Dee Lyon

Ocean policy. American environmental policy generally, and ocean policy in particular, has come a long way over the last four decades. I think it's hard for many people today to imagine the days when pollution was unregulated, huge foreign fishing vessels dominated our fisheries, and building in the coastal zone was a free-for-all. But that was once the reality and the result was a real decline in ocean health that threatened what we as a society want and need from this vast but fragile resource.

Implementing fishing regulations in the northeastern U.S. reversed the adverse trend after decades of overfishing had devastated our coastal resources. This was a battle, because things had to change and change can be hard on people, businesses and communities. It is true that there are some who lose out in the short term, but the alternative is truly the loss of the great fisheries of New England. Undoubtedly things can still get much better, but years of overfishing have been reversed and some key fisheries like scallops and haddock have recovered and are producing more than ever.

It is not uncommon to hear people decry regulation, yet regulation has been responsible for significant improvements in the health of marine and coastal ecosystems. This year marks the 40th anniversaries of several important ocean policies, including the Coastal Zone Management, Marine Mammal Protection, Clean Water, and National Marine Sanctuaries Acts. Once again, we are making progress.

### Sunday, November 4<sup>th</sup> Ventura Wildlife Ponds at Ventura Water Treatment Plant.

Leader: Ron Barns (818) 991-9967. Ducks, gulls, rails, and more. Spotting scopes are always welcome. Directions: Take Harbor Blvd to Spinnaker and enter Ventura Harbor. The Water Treatment Plant is on Angler, a left turn before Spinnaker curves to the right. Park in the available parking across the street and meet at the gate at 8:00 am.

### Thursday, November 8<sup>th</sup> Beginner's Bird Walk

### Friday, November 9<sup>th</sup> Point Mugu Naval Base

### Saturday, November 10<sup>th</sup>, 2012 Mugu Rock, Mugu Lagoon, and Sycamore Canyon

From Mugu Rock, we will scan the ocean for sea ducks, gulls, shearwaters, and other possible pelagic species. We will also visit Mugu Lagoon to look for sandpipers, shorebirds, and egrets. Finally, at Sycamore Canyon, we will look for migrating songbirds. Meet at the Las Posas Park and Ride at 7:30 am. Leader is **Dee Lyon (805) 499-2165**.

### Sunday, November 18<sup>th</sup>, 2012 Arroyo Simi

The arroyo through Simi Valley has a great assortment of shorebirds, ducks, herons, and gulls. Join this self-led, easy walk from Madera Street to First Street and back along the bike path. Expected species include: Green Heron, Blacknecked Stilt, Belted Kingfisher, and White-faced Ibis. Possible birds include Hooded Merganser and Bluewinged Teal. Meet at the entrance to the bike path at Easy Street in Simi Valley, just east of Madera Rd at 8:00 am.

Note: CVAS will again host a trip to the Seal Beach National Wildlife Refuge. This winter's trip is scheduled for Sunday Dec 16, 2012, 8AM to noon. Interested birders must email Michael Zarky (mzarky@earthlink.net) to sign up and to receive further details.

### Santa Clara River Estuary by Dee Lyon Saturday, Sept 1<sup>st</sup>

17 of us hiked the beach on a gorgeous day to find the following 51 species: a big flock of Red-necked Phalarope. Wilson's Phalarope, Brown Pelican, Black-crowned Night Heron, Ruddy Ducks, Mallards, Orange-crown Warbler, Song Sparrow, Amer Coot, Western Gull, Calif Gull, Heerman's Gull, Elegant Tern, Forster's Tern, Turkey Vulture, Horned Lark, Snowy Plover, Sanderling, Marbled Godwit, Whimbrel, Willet, Western Sandpiper, Least Sandpiper, Semipalmated Plover, Western Grebe, Clark's Grebe, Surf Scoter, Common Loon, Earred Grebe, Piedbilled Grebe, Snowy Egret, Great Egret, Gt Blue Heron, Double-crested Cormorant, Brandt's Cormorant, Black Turnstone, Killdeer, Osprey, House Finch, Black Phoebe, Amer Crow, Bufflehead, No Shoveler, Barn Swallow, Cliff Swallow, Tree Swallow, No Rough Wing Swallow, Eurasian Collared Dove, Gt Tailed Grackle, Red-winged Blackbird, No Mockingbird.
