Borneo is a magical place. It's the third largest island in the world, and the northern part is Malaysia with most of the island under Indonesia. Unfortunately the Indonesian jungle is being cut down for African Palm Oil Tree plantations. Malaysia is trying to preserve large portions of jungle, including Mt Kinabalu, Sepilok and the Kanagatangan River areas. It's amazing to have Orangutans feeding over your head, Gibbons on the hill, Pygmy Elephants along the river and six species of Hornbill in one day! Conservation Column By Dee Lyon

LIVESTOCK GRAZING. Livestock grazing impacts more acres of wild native plant communities in California than any other activity. Livestock affect all aspects of native ecosystems from plant and animal species composition to water quality. California Native Plant Society has long been a leader in the search for livestock management techniques that maintain the health native plant and animal communities. They focus their grazing advocacy work on Federal lands, particularly National Forests and BLM lands, where strong resource protection laws mandate that sustainability and good science must guide all land management.

Improperly managed livestock can wreak havoc in ecosystems, spreading invasive non-native weeds, (that s why California is the -golden state: dead nonnative grasses), destroying wetlands, accelerating erosion, and killing rare species. Many California plant communities are too fragile to support any use by livestock. High mountain meadows, for example, dormant much of the year under snow and freezing temperatures, must be protected as much as possible during their short growing season. However, some California ecosystems can withstand conservative, properly managed livestock grazing. So CNPS focus is (1) to determine which ecosystems are incompatible with livestock use and to exclude livestock from these areas, and (2) to develop sustainable, scientifically sound livestock management systems for those ecosystems which can support livestock.

Let support California Native Plant Society (CNPS) for healthy ecosystems.

Saturday, January 5th Saticoy Ponds

We should see a variety of ducks, such as Teal, Gadwall & Bufflehead; Geese are likely, with as many as five species possible; snipe, and wintering passerines. Bring scopes and meet outside the gate. Please be prompt as we need to enter together. Directions: The ponds are located on the northeast side of Hwy 118/Los Angeles Ave. From Ventura take Wells Rd. which turns into Los Angeles Ave./Hwy 118 and cross over the Santa Clara River Bridge. Sunday, January 13th Arroyo Simi - Family Bird Walk

Introducing a new series of trips: Birding for the whole family! We will walk slowly along the

waterøs edge through the Arroyo Simi. The arroyo has a great assortment of shorebirds, ducks, herons, and gulls and is easily accessed via a level bike path that runs from Madera Street to First Street. So bring the whole family, and introduce them to birding. We'll bring extra field guides, but bring binoculars you can share. Emphasis will be on easily made identifications, behavior, and differences among species. Expected species include: Green Heron, Black-necked Stilt, Belted Kingfisher, and White-faced Ibis. Possible birds include Hooded Merganser and Blue-winged Teal. Meet at the entrance to the bike path at Easy Street in Simi Valley, just east of Madera Rd at 8:00 am. Saturday/Sunday, January19th/ 20th Salton Sea Weekend

Away to the Salton Sea with us! We will spend all day Saturday and most of Sunday at the south end of the Salton Sea where impressive flocks of Snow and Ross's Geese winter, along with Sandhill Crane and White-faced Ibis. Shorebirds, Gulls, Grebes, and others also winter in impressive numbers. We will also try for Yellow-footed Gull, which is a Gulf of California breeder, but small numbers wander north to the sea in the non-breeding season. Additionally, we will search local parks and other areas for woodpeckers, Black-tailed Gnatcatcher, Verdin, and other desert residents. Field Trip Reports

Point Mugu field trip, November 9th by Don & Cheryl Williamson

We wondered Thursday night, while watching the rain, if our trip on Friday to Pt. Mugu was going to take place. Friday, however, was just beautiful! Our leader, David Pereksta, helped us find 82 species. We encountered a receding tide and as the mud flats began to appear the bunched up shore birds began to spread out and David was able to count them. He counted 1100 Willets, 950 Western Sandpipers, 800 Long-billed Dowitchers, 420 Marbled Godwits, 310 Northern Pintails, 200 Green-winged Teal, 200 Black-bellied Plovers, 155 American Wigeons, 90 American Avocets, 80 Surf Scoters, and 50 Long-billed Curlews among the higher numbers.

We found four Yellow-crowned Night-herons roosting at their regular location; and a Male Vermilion Flycatcher where he was supposed to be. David mentioned that the four Bonaparteøs Gulls and 11 Elegant Terns we saw were unexpected.

We thank Martin Ruane and David for their expertise. As always a trip to Pt. Mugu is very rewarding. We are very fortunate to have the Naval Base Ventura County available to us.
