Field Trips

Saturday, December 7th Lake Casitas Area

Meet at the Las Posas Park & Ride at 7:15 am or outside the entrance to Lake Casitas at 8 am. We'll explore the eastern arm of the lake and the Bald Eagle nests, watching out for wintering species. We'll also look around outside the lake on Santa Ana Road. Target species include Zone-tailed Hawk (unlikely), Golden-crowned Sparrow, Lewis's Woodpecker, White-tailed Kite and other woodland birds. Meet at the Rancho Park & Ride at 8 am or at Malibu Lagoon at 8:30 am. The lagoon has recently been restored, improving water flow and habitat. Expected species include gulls, terns, shorebirds, sparrows, grebes and ducks. Trip leader: Ron Barns (805) 341-3983

Sunday, December 21st, 2014 Conejo Valley 40th Annual Christmas Bird Count

If you are looking for an easy way to contribute to understanding the status of wintering birds in North America, please join us for the National Audubon Society's 115th annual Christmas Bird Count (CBC) on **Sunday December 21, 2014,** and help cover the Conejo Valley Audubon Society's "Thousand Oaks" CBC circle.

This is our 40th CBC, and we're hoping to top last year's count of 190 species. Last year's highlights included 3 White-winged Scoters, 2 Black Scoters, Common Goldeneye, Red-necked Greg, 24 American White Pelicans, 8 Yellow-crowned Night-Herons, 2 Bald Eages, Ferruginous Hawk, 10 Ridgway's Rails, 15 Red Knots, Stilt Sandpiper, Burrowing Owl, Costa's Hummingbird, 2 Vermilion Flycatchers, Tropical Kingbird, California Gnatcatcher, 10 Vesper Sparrows, Grasshopper Sparrow, Swamp Sparrow and White-throated Sparrow. Birds recorded within a week of the count, but missed on the count day, were Wood Duck and Ring-necked Duck.

Notable misses for the count period were Eurasian Wigeon, Cinnamon Teal, Redhead, Long-tailed Duck, Clark's Grebe, Least Bittern, Common Gallinule, Caspian Tern, Black Skimmer, Common Ground-Dove, Western Screech-Owl, Bell's Sparrow and Yellow-headed Blackbird, Moreover, when all was said and done, we recorded 25,500 individual birds! We hope to do even better this year, but need hardy CVAS members to close out the year right by getting up early and being ready to bird.

The National Audubon Society's web-based pre-registration program is up and working, so just go to <u>http://tinyurl.com/mclmzgl</u> (Conejo Valley's four-letter CBC code is CATO.) This system allows you to register for as many CBCs as you wish, and there is no registration fee! Your name and contact information is forwarded to me, so I have a better idea of how many people are going to participate and can plan accordingly. For those who prefer to contact me directly, please send an email to <u>pereksta@pacbell.net</u>, call (805) 659-5740, or sign up during the December meeting at the Western Foundation of Vertebrate Zoology.

As always, we will cover the area from Westlake to the Oxnard Plain, and from Leo Carrillo State Park to California Lutheran University in Thousand Oaks. We will need to cover the Santa Monica Mountains, La Jolla Canyon, Big Sycamore Canyon, Leo Carrillo State Park, Camarillo Regional Park, the CSU Channel Islands campus, Mugu Lagoon, Camarillo Springs Park, Thousands Oaks Botanic Garden, Los Robles Golf Course, Hill Canyon, Wildwood Park, Calleguas Creek, Revelon Slough, the Oxnard Plain, Hidden Valley, Satwiwa and many other areas.

Please pre-register as soon as possible, and let me know where or with whom you want to bird.

You can also help by "staking out" unusual species such as American White Pelican, Cattle

Egret, Wood Duck, Redhead, Hooded Merganser, Osprey, Band-tailed Pigeon, Common Ground-Dove, Greater Roadrunner, Western Screech-Owl, Burrowing Owl, Common Poorwill, Lewise's Woodpecker, Red-breasted and Red-naped Sapsuckers, Yellow Warbler, White-throated Sparrow, Tricolored Blackbird, Yellow-headed Blackbird, Pine Siskin and Lawrence's Goldfinch.

In addition, we often come close to missing a few common species, including Hutton's Vireo, White-breasted Nuthatch and Townsend's Warbler. So keep an eye out for those prior to the CBC as well.

The CBC began over a century ago when 27 conservationists in 25 localities, lead by ornithologist Frank Chapman, changed the course of ornithological history. On Christmas Day 1900, this small group initiated an alternative activity to the "side hunt." Participants in the "side hunt" would split up up into teams and see who could shoot the most birds and small mammals in a day. Dr. Chapman proposed instead to identify, count and record the birds they saw, thus founding what is considered the most significant citizen-based conservation effort in the USA. The CBC is open to birders of all skill levels. If you do not wish to go further away to count birds, consider "feeder watching" in your back yard. You might attached an unusual hummingbird to your feeder, find an uncommon sparrow or finch or keep an oriole around for us to include.

We will gather to tally up the Christmas Bird Count totals, compare notes and socialize beginning at 6:00 pm at Nobuko McClure's home. We will have pizza and other potluck goodies. If your last name begins with A-M please bring hors d'oeuvre or munchies to share; N-Z a finger-food type dessert which is easy to serve. Paper goods, plastic utensils, coffee and tea will be provided – or bring your own beverage.

To cover the cost of the pizza and paper goods etc. we will be asking for a \$5/person donation. If you plan on attending please **call Nobuko at (805) 482-0411** so she can plan accordingly and provide directions to her home.

Saturday, Dec 27th 2014 Arroyo Verde Park

Enjoy birding the oak woodland, grassy areas and chaparral in this long, broad canyon. We will be pre-scouting for the Ventura Audubon Christmas Bird Count (January 3rd).

Target birds will include: Sharp-shinned Hawk, Red-breasted Sapsucker, Cassin's Kingbird, Golden-crowned Sparrow and Ruby-crowned Kinglet.

Directions: Take Victoria Ave. north, left on Foothill Rd., right on Day Rd. at entrance to the park. Meet at the last parking lot by the restrooms at 8:30 am. NOTE: There is a \$2 entrance fee for parking on the weekends! Leader: David Torfeh (805) 64703325

Friday, January 23rd Point Mugu Navy Base

This trip requires pre-signup at least 3 weeks prior to the trip and is limited to 20 people. Signups are now available only in person at CVAS general meetings due to the extensive nature of the application.

US citizenship, Driver's License number and Social Security number are required to complete application. Picture ID is required on the day of the trip. No cameras or video equipment are permitted on the base. Meet at the base parking lot (corner of Mugu Rd. and Naval Air Road) at 7:45 am. Trip leader is David Pereksta. **Please sign up in person at the December or January general meetings as applications for the trip will not be accepted otherwise.**
