General Meeting, May 2 7:30 pm Western Foundation John Tiszler

John Tiszler has been the plant ecologist and arborist for the National Park Service at the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area since 1997. He has been responsible for all aspects of plant and vegetation inventory, mapping and native plant community restoration. He and his wife have been avid home native plant gardeners since 2000.

John will present the factors one should consider when creating a low water use or native plant garden, with particular emphasis on creating habitat for wildlife. He will discuss practical aspects of installing and maintaining native plants in the home garden. Open discussion is encouraged.

Sunday, May 1st Wheeler Gorge Campground

Wheeler Gorge is a wonder to bird in the spring, when the oak trees team with migrating warblers, tanagers, vireo and flycatchers. Up to six species of hummingbirds are a possibility, and as many as eight species of flycatcher, including Olive-sided, Western Wood-pewee, Dusky, Hammond's and Pacific-slope, can be found. Swainson's Thrushes are also found regularly along the stream bed and Hutton's Vireos should be singing from the tree tops. Add in resident woodpeckers, Steller's Jays, towhees and titmice, and you have the perfect recipe for a great day birding. Meet at 8 am at the entrance to the campground on highway 33. Saturday, May 7th King Gillette Ranch Park

In the central Santa Monica Mountains lies 588 acre King Gillette Ranch Park. It was home to the one time razor blade magnate and now is a jointly managed park that hosts a wide variety of oak woodland and chaparral species. We will search for woodpeckers, thrashers, bluebirds, jays, grosbeaks, orioles, raptors and sparrows.

Directions: Take hwy 101 (Ventura freeway) to the Las Virgenes/Malibu Canyon exit. Head south on Las Virgenes Road and continue to Mulholland Hwy, about two miles. Turn left onto Mulholland Highway and immediately look for the King Gillette Ranch entrance on the right. The address is 26800 West Mulholland Highway Calabasas, CA 91302. To carpool, meet at the Rancho Park and Ride at 7:30 am. Trip starts at 8 am. Trip leader is Bonnie Clarfield-Bylin (805) 405-5632. Please note that Bonnie will *not* be at the carpool site, but will meet the group at the park.

Sunday, May 15th Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Refuge

Join us at a new location for CVAS, the Sepulveda Basin Wildlife Refuge in the San Fernando Valley. This location has the potential for over 100 species in a day, with shorebirds, gulls, flycatchers, hummingbirds, warblers, blackbirds and more! Exit the San Diego Freeway (I-405) on Burbank Blvd. Go west about one half mile to Woodley Avenue and turn right (north). Travel about one-half mile to the second possible right turn (at sign for the Water Reclamation Plant and Japanese Garden). Turn right and go east about one-half mile to Wildlife Area parking at the end of the road. Start time: 8:00 am Leader: Kris Ohlenkamp. Contact him at kris.ohlenamp@sfvaudubon.org or (747) 444-9683.

Saturday, May 21st Tejon Ranch

The Tejon Ranch encompasses the largest single privately held track of land in the state of California, and is uniquely situated at the convergence of the Mojave Desert, the Sierra Nevada, the Central Valley and the Transverse Ranges. This results in a high degree of biodiversity. The members of the Tejon Ranch Conservancy are always gracious and eager to share this unique habitat. Previous trips have included memorable looks at Golden Eagle, Ferruginous and Swainson's Hawks, Scott's Oriole, Ladder-backed Woodpecker, Mountain Quail, warblers, vireo, sparrows and plenty more. We also stand a good chance at seeing reintroduced Pronghorn. We will drive up Interstate 5 to Highway 138, where we will meet with conservancy docents who will lead us on this trip. Plan for the possibility of cool weather. There are no facilities once on the ranch, so please pack a picnic lunch and plenty of water. This trip requires a pre-registration and initially will be limited to CVAS members only. Trip limit: 12. Please email fieldtrips@conejovalleyaudubon.org to sign up.
