Conservation by Dee Lyon Tire Recycling

Tire recycling is the process of recycling waste tires that are no longer suitable for use on vehicles due to wear or irreparable damage. These tires are a problematic source of waste, due to the large number produced, the durability of the tires and the components in the tires that are ecologically problematic. Because they are highly durable and non-biodegradable, they can consume valued space in landfills. In 1990 it was estimated that over one billion scrap tires were in stockpiles in the United States.

As of 2015, only 67 million tires remain in US stockpiles. From 1994 to 2010 the European Union increased the number of tires recycled from 25% of annual discards to nearly 95%. Roughly half the end-of-use tires were used for energy, mostly in cement manufacturing. Newer technologies, such as pyrolysis and devulcanization, have made use of tires for recycling despite their bulk and resilience. End uses for tires include tire-derived fuels, new rubber products, playground surfacing, new tires and rubber-modified asphalt.

Sunday, October 1st Cañada Larga Road

Cañada Larga Road is one of the more reliable spots in Ventura County to find good numbers of migrating and wintering birds in the fall. Though the road is only a few miles long, we can expect to find roadrunners, bluebirds, hawks, kestrels and perhaps even a Golden Eagle. There could be White-crowned, Golden-crowned and even Vesper Sparrows. Time allowing and at the leader's discretion, we may also bird nearby Foster Park. Meet at Las Posas Park and Ride at 7:30 am or under the Highway 33 overpass at 8:00 am. Directions: From Highway 101 take Highway 33 north to the Cañada Larga Road exit. Turn left and park on the shoulder. We will carpool to the site so as to minimize the number of cars. Trip leader is Ron Barns (818) 991-9967.

Sunday, October 8th Rancho Sierra Vista/ Satwiwa

We expect to see woodpeckers, hummingbirds and swallows and at this great park. In the grassland we should be able to find gnatcatchers and California Thrashers. Raptors observed here include White-tailed Kite, Red-tailed Hawk, Cooper's Hawk and American Kestrel. Directions: From Highway 101 exit Wendy Drive and head south. Turn right on Lynn Road. Lynn Road soon becomes Potrero Road. Turn left on Via Goleta (look for the rustic arch signaling the National Recreation Area/ Sierra Vista entrance) and head to the parking lot at the end of the road. Meet at 8 am. Trip leader is Richard Armerding (310) 701-3878

Saturday, October 14th Arroyo Simi (Madera)

Arroyo Simi has a great assortment of shorebirds, ducks, herons and gulls. It is eaily accessed via a level bike path that runs from Madera Street to First Street and on through most of Simi Valley. We will walk slowly along the mostly natural bottomed channel scanning for birds and taking our time to better learn identification skills. Expected species include Green Heron, Black-necked Stilt, Belted Kingfisher and White-faced Ibis. Possible birds include Hooded Merganser and Blue-winged Teal. Meet at 8 am at the entrance to the bike path at Easy Street in Simi Valley, just east of Madera Road. If time allows we will bird other locations in Simi, such as Rancho Simi Community Park. Trip leader is Don Klabunde (805) 522-8023

Saturday, October 21st Lake Casitas

Meet at Las Posas Park and Ride at 7:30 am, or outside the entrance to Lake Casitas at 8:15 am. We'll carpool or walk into the recreation area together. CVAS and VAS are teaming up to explore the eastern arm of the lake, see the Bald Eagle nests and look for wintering species. We'll also look around outside the lake at Santa Ana Road. Target species include Bald Eagle, Zone-tailed Hawk (unlikely), Golden-crowned Sparrow, Lewis's Woodpecker, White-tailed Kite and other water and woodland birds. Directions to Lake Casitas: Take the 101 freeway toward Ventura, turn right on Highway 33, turn left on Highway 150 (Baldwin Rd) and then left on Santa Ana Rd. Entrance to Lake Casitas is within the first 100 yds. on the right. Trip leaders: Dee Lyon (805) 427-0987 and Kay Regester (805) 258-1025 for Ventura Audubon.



Saturday, October 28th Carpinteria Salt marsh

Carpinteria Salt Marsh Nature Park is part of a critically important Southern California estuary which supports many sensitive plant and animal species. The site includes extensive wetland and channel habitats along with some uplands. It lies adjacent to a sandy beach, sub-tidal rocky reef and kelp beds. The reserve provides habitat for migratory waterfowl as well as endangered plants and animals such as salt marsh bird's-beak, Light-footed Ridgway's Rail and Belding's Savannah Sparrow.

This is a unique opportunity to have a guided tour of the private part of the salt marsh that is used by UCSB and other research affiliates to studay the ecology of one of the last coastal salt marshes in southern California. This trip is limited to 25 people and advance registration is required. Please call Linda Easter at 818-519-2833 or email her at lindita517@yahoo.com to add your name to the list.

We will meet at the Estero Road gate to the Carpinteria Salt Marsh Resereve (Note: this is NOT a public entrance.) Everyone must arrive on time as the gate will be locked once we enter. Directions: Take Highway 101 north to Casitas Pass Road in Carpinteria. Turn left over the freeway and proceed to Carpinteria Avenue. Turn right on Carpinteria Avenue and proceed to Estero Street, a small road on the left. Park along Carpinteria Ave or in one of the few spaces on Estero Street and walk to the Estero Street gate. Do not park in the lots of nearby commercial buildings. No potable water is available on site.

Meet at the Las Posas Park and Ride at 7:00 am or at the salt marsh at 8:00 am. Our guide will be Rob Denholtz of UCSB, assisted by Linda Easter for CVAS and VAS.

Online interactive features, teacher guide with activities


Hands-on investigations in local habitats and in the classroom
