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General Meeting February 2 7:30 pm Western Foundation "Raven Rick" Boufford



"Raven Rick" Boufford and his wife, Diana, have been together in the restaurant hospitality business for over 30 years. For 22 years they have run their own restaurant, the Black Sheep Rick has always had great respect for the raven. In 1999 he and his wife Diana took on the challenge of teaching a 15 day old baby raven to fly with the goal of being released safely back into the wild. Their story was first told in a picture book for families. Soon after Rick began video-taping wild ravens for a movie version to be put on DVD entitled "Bob, Huey & Me," which chronicles the couples' escapades with both an adult crow (Bob) and then Huey the baby raven. Raven Rick now has dozens of videos documenting the behavior of these incredibly intelligent and playful birds.

Free-ranging Domestic Cats by Dee Lyon

From a study* we learn that free-ranging domestic cats kill between 1.3 and 4 billion birds, and from 6.3 to 23.3 billion small mammals, (not to mention lizards and insects) in the United States every year! "Free-ranging" domestic cats in this study include ownedk cats that are not kept indoors and wild "feral" cats. The study indicated there were about 85 million owned cats, indoors or outdoors, and 50 million feral cats in the United States in 2013.

Many of us love cats, but their stalking, chasing, catching and playing with objects is instinctive, wild feline behavior that is the product of 25 million years of evolution, and while fascinating to us it can't be changed. An owner may protest that a few birds or lizards killed by his cats don't matter, but over the total population of cats the sum is huge.

We should try to effect a change in our tolerance of free-ranging domestic cats. Try to get your neighbors aware of the problem. Also work to convince various governmental entities to restrict and regulate the maintenance and movement of feral cats on our public lands.

Sunday, Febuary 22nd King Gillette Ranch Park

In the central Santa Monica Mountains lies 588 acre King Gillette Ranch Park, home to the onetime razor blade magnate and now a jointly managed park that hosts a wide variety of oak woodland and chaparral species. We will search for woodpeckers, thrashers, bluebirds, jays and sparrows. Directions: Take Hwy 101 (Ventura Freeway) to the Las Virgenes /Malibu Canyon exit. Head south on Las Virgenes Road and continue to Mulholland Hwy, about two miles. Turn left onto Mulholland Highway and immediately look for the King Gillette Ranch entrance on the right. The address is 26800 West Mulholland Highway, Calabasas, Ca 91302.

> Saturday, February 28th Surfrider Ormond Beach Cleanup

Please come at 9 am and help us clean up the beach in preparation for the 2015 Least Tern and Snowy Plover breeding season at Ormond Beach. Removing man-made debris makes the area less attractive to predators and helps with nest survival. Western Snowy Plovers start nesting as early as March, and so our beach cleanup will occur before there is any chance of disturbing nesting or courting pairs.

Bring water and snacks. Wear layered clothing and bring sunscreen and closed shoes. Porta potties will be on site. Surfrider Foundation will provide beach cleanup supplies, although you are welcome to bring your own. Volunteers must sign a liability waiver. Underage volunteers are welcome, but they must have a parent or guardian present to sign a waiver. Directions: Hwy 101 south and exit on Rice Then turn right and continue to Hueneme Rd.
